Entrepreneurship and innovation

Joinville, an industrial and technological hub, is home to renowned institutions of higher and technical education. It is one of the most entrepreneurial and competitive cities in Brazil, and it is also a leader in job creation. Joinville is the only city in Santa Catarina on the list of the 25 municipalities with the highest participation in Brazil's Gross Domestic Product (GDP), according to the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE). Joinville also has the third largest economy in the country's south.



Specialized logistics



Southern Brazil's third largest economy is strategically located. It is situated just outside of a duplicate stretch of the BR-101 and is home to a 500,000-passenger-year airport. They also have easy access to three other major airports within 200 kilometers: Curitiba, Navegantes, and Florianópolis. Joinville is located near five major ports in southern Brazil: Paranaguá (120 km), Itapoá (80 km), São Francisco do Sul (57 km), Navegantes (85 km), and Itajaí (88 km).







Quality of life



Brazil's Best City to Live is situated between the mountains and the sea. According to the Guinness Book of Records, it is home to the largest Dance Festival in the world, the only Bolshoi Ballet school outside of Russia, and the most traditional Festa das Flores in Brazil. It is also proud to be home to Brazil's oldest volunteer fire department. It is a safety and education reference. With a population of over 600,000 people, it is one of the municipalities with the highest HDI in the country and has a cost of living that is up to 25% lower than cities such as Rio de Janeiro and São Paulo.



Future and planning



Joinville has a Strategic Plan for Municipal Economic Development, which focuses on the municipality's long-term growth (PEDEM). The document outlines five axes that will guide the city's development, as defined by a collaboration between companies, government, business entities, unions, teaching and research institutions, and leaders. They are:

- Metalworking Productive Chains, Rubber, and Plastic;
- Health and Wellness;
- Tourism, Culture, and the Creative and Collaborative Economy;
- Technological Innovation;
- Logistics.
